## *Contact Organizations and Funding Opportunities*

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**Most state conservation/natural resources departments and even some special interest environmental groups have ecological or ecosystem partnerships in place that offer funding programs for management of ecosystem or watershed-based land regions.** Becoming an active partner in one of these offers an opportunity to obtain funding for carrying out management objectives, thereby offsetting the financial burden of your goals. Education is very important in reaching the general public and interpreting the invaluable resource we have in amphibians and reptiles and their usefulness in the environment. Dispelling fears most people have about reptiles and replacing that with an appreciation for the resource goes a long way in changing attitudes about protecting and preserving habitat.

**The Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) has offices in nearly every county across the Midwest. The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) also maintains offices throughout the Midwest.** These offices have staff trained in many areas of land management techniques and are in a position to provide contact information for many other skilled persons in their local area. **Professional reptile and amphibian experts (herpetologists) may also be willing to help you in the many aspects of your planning and implementation of management techniques process.** Many state agencies have herpetologists on staff. Another way to obtain contact details for professional herpetologists is by contacting a local university with a Department of Biology. Hopefully, a faculty member will be able to point you in the right direction. Partners in Amphibian and Reptile Conservation (PARC) is beginning to develop a state-by-state resource directory that includes a listing of professional herpetologists.
